What is a CAA?

A Community Action Agency or CAA are local non-profit organizations that carry out community actions programming. CAAs were founded by the 1964 Economic Opportunity Act to fight poverty. Each CAA has a variety of programs to meet specific local needs and each CAA is unique to the communities it serves.

Each CAA is governed by a Board of Directors consisting of three groups in equal parts: Low-income community members, public officials, and private sector leaders

What is Head Start?



Purpose

Head Start and Early Head Start programs are free and federally funded. They are designed to promote school readiness for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers from families who meet income eligibility requirements.

Models

Head Start offers a variety of models for programming including home based, center based, locally designed, and partnership models to fit the needs of the community.

Head Start vs. Early Head Start

Early Head Start serves pregnant mothers up to 3 year olds and Head Start serves children 3 to 5 years old.

Head Start:

- Head Start programs operate in every state, many tribal nations, and several U.S. territories.
- Our programs focus in the areas of early learning development, family well-being, family engagement, and health and wellness.
- The goals of Head Start are:
- to create welcoming learning environments that support all children, regardless of circumstances
- build strong relationships as a foundational driver for early learning with children and families
- Promote positive health including physical activity, oral hygiene, balanced nutrition, addressing mental and behavioral health needs, ensuring children receive screenings needed for growth



- Provide parenting support and strategies
- Connect families to community and federal assistance
- Engaging parents as their child's lifelong advocate
- Better the family situation so the family, as a whole, can grow in a healthy environment

What is the Health Advisory Committee?



The Health/ Mental Health Services Advisory Committee (HMHSAC) is an advisory group usually composed of local health providers who represent a wide variety of local social services agencies.

They may include pediatricians, doctors, nurses, nurse practitioners, dentists, nutritionists, mental health ,safety experts, and really anyone who has knowledge in health, safety and wellness.

Head Start staff and parents also serve on the HMHSAC. Effective partnerships are key to the success of this approach.

HMHSACs help programs to make decisions about health services and strengthen the communities where Head Start families live.

It also assists programs in identifying resources, develop policies or procedures, and other activities.
